- African Americans make up 14.4% of the U.S. population
 - 33% of the national cost for dementia care.

- 65 % know someone with Alzheimer's
- 80% have some barriers to support
- 55% think significant memory loss is a natural part of aging

 Hypertension (HTN)
 Diabetes (DM)
 Stroke (CVA)


Hypertension (HTN)

• **65% percent** of AA Medicare beneficiaries have hypertension, compared to **51%** white.

• AA are also at higher risk of stroke.

DM

African-Americans have 70%
 higher risk of type 2 diabetes.

 African-Americans tend to be diagnosed at a later stage.

Zip code and Dementia


 AA were 40 percent more likely to develop dementia if they'd been born in a state with high infant mortality.

• White people's risk of dementia wasn't affected by their place of birth.

Faith Communities

• Dementia-friendly faith communities can provide an important **spiritual respite**.

 Raise awareness, reduce stigma, and promote support in your community and others by spreading dementia-friendly principles.

Communication Skills

- Greet people warmly even if you think they do not remember you.
- Keep communication simple
- Be aware of the person's and your own body language
- Avoid arguing with or embarrassing.

Environmental tips

- Wear name tags.
- Be positive and focus on strengths
- Provide a quiet area
- Display signs that clearly identify areas

Engage

- Organize meaningful activities
- Offer shorter, simpler services.

Individualize

- Learn how the spiritual beliefs of the person with dementia may affect their perceptions of dementia.
- Be open-minded to how the person talks about his/her spirituality.
